1 POLICY STATEMENT

The Department of Education requires all employees to adhere to consistent and high quality practices for the care and use of animals in schools.

Effective: 5 August 2014

2 POLICY RULES

When using animals for a scientific teaching activity principals and teachers must:

- adhere to the requirements of the <u>Australian code for the care and use of</u> animals for scientific purposes 8th edition;
- obtain prior written approval from the Schools Animal Ethics Committee;
- where an activity is pre-approved by the Schools Animal Ethics Committee, adhere to any guidelines or <u>Standard Operating Procedures</u> that apply to the activity to be conducted; and
- report on the use of the animals in the manner prescribed by the Schools Animal Ethics Committee.

When using animals for teaching activities other than science, at an agricultural college or school with a farm, principals and school staff must:

- promote and protect the welfare, safety and health of animals;
- undertake proper and humane care and management of all animals in accordance with generally accepted standards, guidelines and <u>Standard</u> <u>Operating Procedures</u> that apply;
- ensure that students also adhere to high quality practices for the care and use of animals;
- obtain prior approval from the Director, Agricultural Education for activities not generally accepted as routine management; and
- report on the use of animals in the manner prescribed by the Director, Agricultural Education.

For animals kept on school premises, where the circumstances are not included in the above policy rules (for example, classroom pets and chickens in vegetable gardens) principals will be responsible for the welfare of these animals.

Guidance

Animal welfare is managed in accordance with the Animal Welfare Act 2002.

This policy does not apply to:

- the use of living things not within the definition of animal, for example insects, spiders, worms, and snails; and
- the use of animals for dissections where those animals are obtained already euthanized from a licensed scientific supplier (such as the Animal Resource Centre).

Approval of an application for the use of animals for a scientific teaching activity can be granted for a period of up to three years.

Detailed information regarding the requirements and processes of the Schools Animal Ethics Committee are available on the <u>Animal Ethics website</u>.

Agricultural colleges and schools with farms do not require approval from the Schools Animal Ethics Committee for routine management and care of animals or use of animals for teaching activities under the technologies curriculum. Should a school or agricultural college undertake a scientific activity using their farm animals they are required to seek approval for the activity from the Schools Animal Ethics Committee.

3 RESPONSIBILITY FOR IMPLEMENTATION AND COMPLIANCE

Principals are responsible for the implementation of the policy.

The Deputy Director General, Schools is responsible for compliance monitoring.

ANIMAL

1 POLICY SUPPORTED

Use of Animals in Schools Policy

2 SCOPE

These procedures apply to principals and teachers.

3 PROCEDURES

3.1 APPROVAL

Teachers must:

- prior to seeking approval, refer to the <u>Australian code for the care and use of</u> <u>animals for scientific purposes 8th Edition 2013</u>;
- submit <u>Form A1: Proposal for the use of animals: primary and secondary</u> <u>schools</u> and obtain written approval from the Schools Animal Ethics Committee prior to the commencement of a scientific teaching activity; and
- submit an amendment notification if there is any variation to the activity, including staff changes, to the original proposal and not proceed until approval has been granted by the Schools Animal Ethics Committee

Guidance

Standard Operating Procedures

To assist schools to adhere to consistent and high quality practices for the care and use of animals in schools, the Schools Animal Ethics Committee has developed <u>Standard Operating Procedures</u> for a number of activities:

- Chicken Egg Hatching
- Small Scale Poultry Housing
- Caged Birds
- Fish Euthanasia
- Humane Destruction of Livestock

When seeking approval for a scientific teaching activity, the teacher should demonstrate consideration of the Three R's; replacement, reduction and refinement from the <u>Australian</u> code of practice for the care and use of animals for scientific purposes 8th Edition 2013.

Chicken egg hatching is considered to be a scientific teaching activity and requires the submission of a proposal.

Approval is not required for the use of animals for purely observation activities or non-scientific activities. This may include animals kept as class pets such as goldfish, budgies and mice or chickens kept as part of a kitchen garden project.

If a teacher is unsure whether an activity requires approval, the teacher should contact the Executive Officer of the Schools Animal Ethics Committee.

3.2 REPORTING

Teachers must:

where animals are used for a scientific teaching activity, complete a <u>Form E:</u>
 <u>Activity Completion</u> at the completion of the activity; and

 where approval is granted to undertake the activity on a recurring basis, the teachers must submit <u>Form D: Annual Report</u> at the completion of the activity each year, or by the last day of Term 4.

3.3 ILLNESS/INJURY, DEATH OR UNEXPECTED INCIDENT

Principals or teachers must:

- seek appropriate veterinary assistance and treatment, in a timely manner when an animal experiences an illness, injury or unexpected incident; and
- complete Form C2: Illness/injury, death or unexpected incident report and forward it to the Executive Officer of the Schools Animal Ethics Committee within one working day of the event.

3.4 RECORD KEEPING

Teachers must maintain records of the use, care and monitoring of animals that are sufficient to enable the Schools Animal Ethics Committee to verify that the wellbeing of animals has been monitored as agreed and allow review and critical investigation of the cause(s) of and responses to unexpected adverse events.

Guidance

<u>Form C1: Animal Use and Health Records</u> has been developed for use by schools however alternative formats can be developed for the on-going monitoring of animals, providing all the information contained in the Form C1 is retained.

3.5 DISPLAYING THE LICENCE

Principals must confirm that a copy of the Department's current *Animal Use Licence* is on display in any place where animals are used for scientific purposes.

Any live non-human vertebrate (that is, fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds and mammals encompassing domestic animals, purpose-bred animals, livestock, wildlife) and cephalopods.

SCIENTIFIC TEACHING ACTIVITY

1 POLICY SUPPORTED

Use of Animals in Schools Policy

2 SCOPE

These procedures apply to principals and school staff.

3 PROCEDURES

3.1 ROUTINE CARE AND MANAGEMENT OF ANIMALS

School staff must:

- adhere to consistent, high quality practice for the care and management of animals in accordance with the Animal Welfare Act 2002;
- use a <u>Standard Operating Procedure</u> or Model Code of Practice endorsed by the Agricultural Education directorate for the relevant activity where available;
- when undertaking activities not considered to be routine management of animals, submit a *Form A: Proposal for the use of animals on school farms for non-routine activities* and obtain written approval from the Director, Agricultural Education prior to the commencement of the activity.

Guidance

For copies of the form or to determine whether an activity is routine management of animals or not, contact the Agricultural Education Branch on 9264 4107.

School staff must not demonstrate to students or allow students to carry out the following activities:

- animal breeding that does not achieve an educational outcome and fails to provide for the lifetime welfare of animals (and their offspring, if relevant);
- induction of an infectious disease or illness;
- production of nutritional deficiency;
- exposure to a condition that would cause an animal to experience pain and/or distress;
- administration of drugs or chemicals unless for therapeutic or diagnostic purposes; or
- administration of toxins, ionising radiation or biohazards.

Surgical or other painful procedures must only be done by qualified personnel or a registered veterinarian.

Guidance

Standard Operating Procedures and Guidelines

To assist schools to adhere to consistent and high quality practices for the care and management of animals in schools, a number of guidelines and <u>Standard Operating Procedures</u> apply:

- Downer Cow Standard Operating Procedure
- Managing Calving Cows
- Guidelines for post-mortem
- Land Transport of Livestock
- Fish Euthanasia
- Humane Destruction of Livestock

3.2 REPORTING

Principals must:

- submit Form C: Livestock Report to the Director, Agricultural Education on a regular basis including livestock deaths; and
- undertake a physical livestock count annually.

Guidance

For copies of the form, contact the Agricultural Education Branch on 9264 4107.

3.3 UNEXPECTED INCIDENT

Principals and school staff must, when an animal experiences an illness or injury, or dies in unusual or unexpected circumstances:

- provide appropriate treatment, in a timely manner; and
- submit *Form B: Unexpected Animal Incident Report* to the Director, Agricultural Education within 24 hours of the event.

Guidance

Deaths of the following animals are reportable using Form B: Unexpected Animal Incident Report:

- large animals, for example horses, cattle and alpaca; and
- other animals in the event of multiple deaths, animal attack, suspicious events including human intervention and any events that may have an adverse impact on the welfare of animals.

3.4 RECORD KEEPING

School staff must maintain records of the use, care and monitoring of animals that are sufficient to enable the Director, Agricultural Education to verify that the wellbeing of animals has been monitored as agreed and allow review and critical investigation of the cause(s) of and responses to unexpected adverse events.
